VIRTUAL INTERVIEW PREPARATION & COACHING FOR TRAINEES

Help your trainees anticipate technical and interpersonal challenges

Consider this situation...

A trainee comes to you for advice on how to make the best impression during an upcoming virtual interview. Along with the advice you typically provide on how to prepare for an interview, you reflect on the technical and interpersonal challenges unique to virtual interviews in graduate medical education.

How then, can mentors and program leadership prepare trainees for the challenges of interviewing via a virtual platform (Microsoft Teams, Thalamus, WebEx, Zoom, etc.)?

Virtual vs in-person interviews:

Applicants value the flexibility in scheduling, as well as the time and money saved. The increased convenience, cost savings through elimination of travel and lodging, and equitable access to a broad array of programs across the country for applicants is offset by some of the challenges and limitations of virtual interviews, most notably the inability to visit the program's city and facilities. Virtual interviews still allow for meaningful two-way interaction, standardization of questions and evaluation processes, as well as scheduling based on interviewer and interviewee needs.

What do you need to do to prepare for a virtual interview?

Virtual interviewees shouldn't just show up on their interview day and hope to make a good impression. They must remember that this is a professional job interview, and though the venue may *seem* informal, the process is most certainly not. Coaching students and residents on how to present themselves involves not only dressing professionally, but also assuring that the technical aspects of the interview experience are as optimized as possible.

Consider providing a space to interview at your institution for trainees who are unable to interview from home

PRACTICAL PEARLS

- Practice interviewing with technology and check tech again 15 mins before
- ☐ Have contact number should problems arise
- Put a sign outside of the room 'Quiet please, interviewing.'
- Silence all electronic notifications
- Use a professional screen name and photo
- Be expressive with your face, voice, and smile
- Keep answers succinct and to the point

Agenda and content for virtual interview preparation sessions

Prior to interview season, faculty and program leadership can set up structured virtual interview tech check-ups and "open houses." Here is a walk-through of some of the key issues to review and practice.



Charged and ready

Charge devices and keep them connected to a power supply throughout the day. Have a backup plan and device if the primary method fails unexpectedly. Practice using the application, review log-in instructions, pay attention to time zones, and log-in ahead of time.



All dressed up with somewhere to go?

Always dress professionally! Faces should be centered in the video window. Prepare for interruptions from children, pets, and deliveries. Busy or messy décor may draw attention – a neutral wall, or lightly adorned room is sufficient. Items in the background may lead to questions from the interviewer. Virtual backgrounds can be distracting and can crop out portions of the body.



Video and cameras

The image quality of cell phones or tablets is often superior to laptops, but a dedicated webcam or integrated laptop camera may be more convenient. If using a cell-phone, obtain a small tripod.



Lighting

Sit in a well-lit room with natural light. A sun-lit window behind the subject will create a silhouette. A ring light or desk lamp aimed indirectly in front of the interviewee will brighten the face. A bright light directly aimed at glasses wearers may create unwanted reflections.



Rock solid internet

Use a wired/ethernet connection if possible. If on Wi-Fi, stay close to the router. Perform an internet speed-test in advance at different locations. Turn off notifications and other data hungry programs.



Audio

Laptop microphones may transmit a hollow "tinny" sound. Wired USB microphones, either desktop or headset, offer a superior experience. Bluetooth ear buds also have excellent microphones. Practice pairing in advance and keep them charged during breaks. Provide loaner devices if your trainees need them.



Screen real estate and eye contact

Organize the screen to display the video conference application at the top, near the camera. This facilities eye contact, which in a virtual interview is **looking at the camera – not the person**. A "look here!" sticky note near the web cam helps as well. The bottom of the screen can be for notes & questions.



You meet with your trainee after the interview and receive gratitude for all your coaching. Your trainee shares that although technical difficulties occurred, they successfully navigated the challenges calmly and with professionalism. This interviewee additionally remarked on how well the overall interview went.
