What is Self-Directed Learning (SDL)?

Self-Directed Learning is the competency in which a professional uses individualized, self-regulated, and effective learning strategies to successfully address the lifelong demands of an ever-evolving field of medicine.







Teacher-learner interactions


Social/team context

What contributes to SDL?

Learner characteristics— Adult learners thrive when they have ownership of learning content and methods.

Teacher-learner interactions— Faculty should promote safe learning climates, facilitate critical thinking and self-reflection, and suggest resources and strategies.

Social/team context— The training environment fosters intellectual curiosity by supporting group learning and individualized study opportunities.

How YOU Can Promote Your Learner's SDL

- 1. Guide your learners' needs assessment and reflection
- Trainees vary in their ability to self-assess. Stimulate these skills by encouraging the learner to ask themselves:
 - · What skills are my strengths/weaknesses?
 - · Am I struggling or in need of help?

2. Assist learners in creating effective goals & objectives


- The ACGME recommends use of individual learning plans (ILPs) as a contract to promote improvement across the competencies and lifelong learning.
- · Encourage a SMART framework to construct goals & achievable objectives.

3. Aid learners in implementing effective individualized learning strategies

- · Role model habits of finding, interpreting, and applying evidence
- Demonstrate how to use preferred sources, how to digest complex information, and how to reflect upon it in small portions.

4. Facilitate learners' evaluation of their learning efficacy

- · Recommend learners self-quiz on learning, and/or teach others.
- · Promote use of a learning portfolio, follow up on progress measurements.



Back to your resident

You praise the resident for identifying her need to learn more about the major congenital cyanotic heart lesions. You help her update the Individual Learning Plan with the SMART framework to set new goals. Over the remainder of the rotation, she plans to study one key diagnosis every three days and create an outline of the major clinical findings, prognosis and treatment for each. She shares new pearls with the students on the team and tests herself with related cardiology questions. By the end of the first week, she feels encouraged by her progress.




