- Seek advice from mentors -Including members of the APT (Promotion & Tenure0 Commitee.

- 3. Be aware of your faculty track and criteria - Be certain that what you do fits the track (Confer with your Division Chief)
- 4. Stick to the format precisely
- 5. Keep it complete and updated

#### NCH MED ED LAUNCHES FACULTY SUCCESS FOR FACULTY AND TRAINEES

The Department of Medical Education launched "Faculty Success" by Watermark. This software allows faculty and trainees to enter items from their CV in a pre-determined fields. The Peer reviewed publications flow directly from Pub-Med. Once the information is in the system, the user is able to run reports, customize the look of their CV, including running various versions of CV by date ranges, including running an NIH Biosketch. ### **Tips & Resources for Researchers - Sample Size Calculation**

*Mr. Gabriel Cardenas, MPH*; • That should be a first step to NCH Research Institute Data Analyst shared the following helpful tips and resources with all NCH Researchers:

#### Tip #1: SAMPLE COMPARI-SONS

- Once you have decided on a unique research idea, and you want to compare groups, the first thing you should do is a quick sample size calculation using the averages and standard deviations of the groups (maybe get from literature or look at some previous data), and what you would consider to be a meaningful difference between the group means (clinically significant).
- see if the study can get enough people to see the difference you consider meaningful, if there is one, and thus find a statistically significant difference.
- Here are the links to a simple 2 group average comparison t-test sample size calculator

If its anything harder than that the RAD group can calculate one for you.

#### Tip #2: DESCRIPTIVE STUDY

- If you're doing a descriptive study, you may still want to check your sample size; because the larger the sample size the more precise the estimated numbers you are reporting will be.
- For example, if you are going to report the rate of exacerbations, or the number of people having a symptom, or the average level of some lab reported value: you can put some number, lets just say randomly - 157 g/ml is what you observed. If your sample size is large, you could say:157 +-5 g/ml; but if your sample size is small you might only be able to report 157 +-20 g/ml.
